Abbas Zahedi: *Holding a Heart in Artifice* at Nottingham Contemporary Sat 27 May – Sun 3 Sep 2023

Abbas Zahedi's exhibition *Holding A Heart in Artifice* explores care, grief and support systems at Nottingham Contemporary

Nottingham Contemporary is delighted to announce *Holding A Heart in Artifice*, a new solo exhibition by British artist Abbas Zahedi, open to the public from Saturday 27 May to Sunday 3 September 2023. Zahedi (b.1984) is an interdisciplinary artist whose practice blends contemporary philosophy, poetics, and social dynamics with sound, sculpture, and other gestures. With an emphasis on how personal and collective histories interweave, his artistic work explores the connections that are found or formed around specific contexts.

Holding A Heart in Artifice is a newly commissioned installation and engagement programme that continues Zahedi's ongoing investigations into care, grief, and contemporary philosophy. The exhibition combines visual and sensory elements including a large architectural intervention, sculpture, an original music score and enactments of tenderness. Recognising the similiarities between clinical, medicalised spaces and sites of contemporary art, Zahedi spent time with a local hospital specialising in Extracorporeal Membrane Oxygenation (ECMO) – a life support therapy that uses an artificial heart-lung machine to oxygentate the blood outside the body of a patient. In the exhibition, an ECMO unit pumps moisture gathered from the gallery around a closed system,





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representing the ways in which artists, artwork, galleries and audiences are contingent upon one another.

Throughout the exhibition an engagement programme will expand on the ideas held in the work. These include a series of skill-sharing "How to Make" sessions, co-devised by Zahedi and Nottingham Contemporary's Learning and Live Programme teams which will reflect on themes within the exhibition; such as community-building, grief, care and emotional processing.

Zahedi's work highlights the importance of support systems in navigating complex emotional and physical experiences. The exhibition is a poignant exploration of the human experience and promises to be an engaging and thought-provoking experience for visitors.
