ABOUT THE EXHIBITION:

A cross-generational group exhibition.

The gallery will be resplendent with colourful artworks reflecting the festive season with humour, pathos and gravitas.

For respite from a confusing world, Sharon Leahy-Clark paints fantastical creatures of her imagination that delight the child within each of us and sit well next Bob and Roberta Smith's colourful sign painting with the slogan that Art Exists like Love Between Us All. Monika Beisner (who illustrated Ovid, Dante, and Gilgamesh) demonstrates her playfulness with twelve reverse glass paintings of her own little monsters. With hand-fashioned silicone rubber sculptures, Laura White has created friendly monsters while Rosemarie McGoldrick's black velvet and wire pieces have the pathos of Paul Klee's puppets. Stephen Lewis's fantastical red sculpture is not what you think it is. Painters Archie Franks and Sabrina Shah are inspired by funfairs, toys and food, Rachel Mercer paints London street life, and Laura Barnard's whimsical painting reflects the same mood in a garden. Henry Ward has used collage to make odd cut-out organic shapes somewhere between abstraction and figuration. Laurence Noga's colourful painting conjures up an abstract harlequin. Diane Howse's evocative colour based abstractions glow and resonate. Mark Wright is an abstract landscape painter inspired by atmosphere where colour evokes sensation, and Alix MacSweeney, Ruth Helen Smith and Ondrej Rypacek's paintings generate the mood contrast of carnivals. Sean Coates' hilarious portrait of Pete and Bas (a hip-hop duo of comedians) at the seaside contrasts with Xingxin Hu's sophisticated cropped lady's torso that evokes the sensuality and decadence of Art Déco. Fiona G. Roberts' female faces experience everything. Meanwhile Anna van Oosterom's collage reminds us that time is watching.
